## STREET INCIDENT

**Hartshill Man in Court at Stoke**

John Porter, aged 36, of 332, Hartshill-road, Hartshill, was ordered to pay 4s. costs when he was summoned at Stoke Police Court yesterday for being drunk and disorderly on September 2nd.

Police-Constable Colough gave evidence that he went to defendant's home with the intention of warning him that a complaint had been made against him. He refused to go back into the house, and insisted that he was going to have a fight with the police or someone else.

Defendant, who pleaded Not Guilty, denied that he was drunk, and said a complaint had been made against him at the back of the neck. The same man had insulted his wife. He had been on A.R.P. work, and had not been in bed since Thursday night. If he could have afforded he would have summoned the other man.

William Roberts, of Hartshill, said he saw a man strike defendant. Defendant might have had a drink, but he was not drunk.

# CITIZENS' ADVICE FOR CITIZENS

## BUREAUX TO BE SET UP IN SEVERAL PARTS OF NORTH STAFFS.

**VOLUNTARY WORK**

In co-operation with the National Council of Social Service, steps are being taken to establish at various points throughout North Staffordshire a series of Citizens' Advice Bureaux.

Social Service organisations in many towns have set up similar bureaux, the object being that the public will be provided with vital information on personal and social problems. The success of their work will depend upon a simple but efficient scheme of organisation, and the willingness of local authorities, voluntary bodies, and private individuals to co-operate.

Apart from the problems peculiar to a war, the bureaux will provide for advice about hostel and lodging accommodation for workers transferred from other parts of the country; cautions and clubs and other social facilities; and the provision made by central and local authorities for the prevention and relief of distress, together with the auxiliary services available from voluntary societies for the same purpose.

## QUIET CYCLING REGIONS

Inevitably, the programme of cycling club events has, for the most part, been held up and track racing has been suspended, and, although week-end touring activities will continue, there will, of course, be some adjustment and revision of venues by officials, in order to ensure that club units can be back before sunset.

The majority of cyclists are wisely confined to the roads, and in daylight hours, but those who have to ride at night should conform strictly to the following regulations, which have been enforced by the times—

Pedal cyclists must now carry red rear lamps, hooded and dimmable, so that no light is thrown directly upwards and no appreciable light is thrown on the ground during the hours of darkness.

When an air raid warning is sounded, cyclists must take their eyes off the road and put them on the ground, and must not be taken into a public shelter.

A cycle must not be left propped against the kerb and must not be taken into a public shelter.

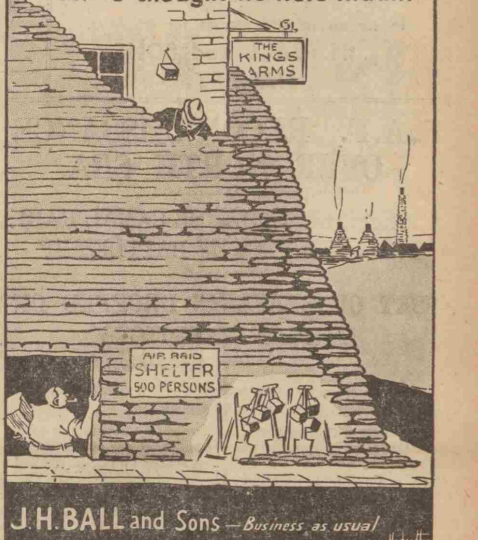
The other day a writer was deploring the scarcity of regions where he could enjoy quietness and solitude.

**Man Falls From Bus**

Sequel to road incidents were heard at the Newcastle Borough Police Court, yesterday.

Stanley Firminstone, of 58, Garden-street, Newcastle, was summoned for failing to take all reasonable precautions to ensure the safety of passengers, while a conductor of a public motor vehicle, when it was stationary. At the time, the conductor was writing down his ticket numbers. Witness stated on the platform that he saw the man fall, but he could not get into the saloon, and paid his fare. After the bus had moved the man was a sick and witness lost his balance and fell off. He did not blame the conductor now, but defendant, who when the bus was stationary, said he was perfectly safe. Blackshaw had plenty of time to get himself into a safe position. Witness thought he intended going upstairs.

William Alfred Chadwick, of 70, Dimesdale View, Porthill, who was also in the bus, said the conductor was taking every precaution and the blame lay with the passenger.

**Bus and Lorry Crash**

At the same court Harold Swingevoed, of 4, Mow Cop-road, Mow Cop, was summoned for driving a motor bus without due care and attention.

Mr. A. Worthington appeared for defendant, who pleaded Not Guilty.

Police evidence was that defendant drove his bus out of Westgate into High-street, Silverdale, and collided with a lorry, which was being driven by Joseph Hogg, of 46, Church-street, Silverdale, and he was driving on High-street and near the lorry driver sound a warning. The bus, however, kept on moving and struck the main road and a lorry moving when the impact occurred.

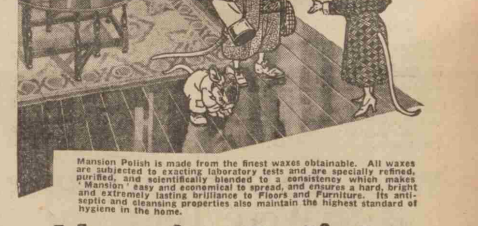
Arthur Roylands, of Bridge Bungalow, Church Lawton, the lorry driver, said he saw the bus at the corner, but he kept on as he was on the main road. The bus collided with the side of his lorry.

Defendant said that opposite the entrance to Sneyd-terrace, there was a stationary vehicle, and an accident happened because the lorry was cutting past the stationary vehicle. He stopped before going into High-street.

Defendant was fined 30s. and ordered to pay one guinea costs.
