Benefits and the Budget

Yesterday's Budget had some good news and some bad news for people claiming benefits and tax credits.

This week, we'll be looking at what 2021 has in store if you get UC or Tax Credits and what happened to the £20 uplift.

There were other changes too, which we'll explain in more detail in future weeks.

Some measures are time-limited so, on the back page, we've put together a timeline to show you what's happening and when.

KEEPING THE LIFELINE - FOR NOW!

Despite pressure to make the **£20 uplift** to UC and working tax credit permanent, the Chancellor has extended it for just **six more months**.

And there was **no uplift to legacy benefits** like Income Support and ESA...



To switch or not to switch that's still the question!

Andy is a lone parent with two young children. He works part-time, earning £13,500 per year. He claims Child Tax Credit of £119.14 per week.

Right now, his family would be about £14 per week better off on Universal Credit, but UC rates will be cut in the autumn. He would then be about £6 per week worse off, and he might have to make a Claimant Commitment to look for more or better-paid work.

BUDGET BENEFITS TIMELINE

APRIL 2021

£500 payment oneoff payment with Working Tax Credit but £20 per week uplift removed.

UC advances to be recovered over 24 months, not 12.

Max. deductions from UC reduced to 25% of

standard allowance.

JUNE 2021

Single room rate rent restriction in UC and HB removed for under 25s who are care leavers or have spent 3 months or more in a homeless hostel.

JULY 2021

Minimum Income Floor earnings rules for UC to resume.

October 2021

£20 uplift to Universal Credit rates due to end.

Normal working hours requirements for Working Tax Credit resume.

Furlough scheme due to end

April 2022

Surplus earnings threshold for UC reduced from £2500 to £300.





WORKING TAX CREDIT CHANGES

The 2021/2022 tax year seems to start well if your tax credits are currently worked out including Working Tax Credit (WTC) elements, as you will get a **£500 one-off payment**.

This is instead of getting the extra six months £20 per week uplift to people getting Universal Credit.

You do not have to repay the £500 payment if you later stop qualifying for WTC or swap to UC. But expect your **regular payments** to be **lower from April**, as the £20 per week uplift is ending.

After furlough ends, from October 2021, you will need to be working the usual minimum hours per week to keep WTC:

- 30 hours for a single person or couple without dependent children,
- 24 hours for a couple with dependent children and one works 16+ hours,
- 16 per week for a lone parent, disabled worker or member of a couple where the other is not expected to be in work.

If you are not working these hours by then, you qualify for Child Tax Credit only.

Always get advice before deciding to swap to UC, as you cannot go back to tax credits once you make a UC claim.
